


Just the Facts

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Ohio bans abortion after a "heartbeat" is detected. Many organizations and medical professionals refer to this as a 6-week ban.

What does the ban actually mean?





This activity can be seen with an ultrasound about 6 weeks after the last menstrual period.

Calling it a "heartbeat" is misleading and makes embryonic development seem more advanced than it really is.

In Ohio, the six-week abortion ban criminalizes doctors who provide abortions, but not people who have them.

There are a few exceptions to Ohio's 6-week abortion ban:

- if the pregnant person faces a life-threatening medical condition (but not for a mental health crisis)
- if the pregnancy is outside the uterus (like with an ectopic pregnancy)

Many people do not know they are pregnant by 6 weeks. Even for those who do know, abortions have often happened after 6 weeks.

Why? Factors outside the patient's control impact when they have an abortion. These factors include structural racism, financial hardship, clinic waiting times, and more (1).
